ROSY CHEEKS WITH BLUSH STAIN

To find the apples of your cheeks, smile and line up your index finger with the end of your brow. The apple ends where your finger and cheek meet.

Remove dead skin and dry spots by using an exfoliating scrub (a smooth surface keeps the stain from spotting). Follow up with oil-free moisturizer.

Using a makeup sponge, dab the stain onto the apples, not along cheekbones (we love Mark Tint, Tint Lip and Cheek Gel in Blossom, \$6, meetmark.com).

TA-DA!
Use your fingers to blend, using a circular motion around the apple. Work fast, or the stain will set before it's blended!
